Toronto Branch appeared, briefly, in the Guinness Book of World Records for the world's biggest *Eightsome Reel* (a 512-some). We were quickly overtaken but we made a noble counter-attempt at a *1024-some Reel* (see below).

Distinguished visitors from Scotland this November Getting to know Andrew Kellett . . . Guest at the 60th Anniversary Dance

I started dancing at age 10 at a children's class in Bradford, Yorkshire. Why, I don't really know, but I was fascinated by Scottish history, the '45 and all that. So began a lifetime of fun, friendship, and a modest level of fitness.

That first class was a wonderful experience. Our teacher, Rhoda Shaw, gave us a fantastic grounding in the fundamentals of Scottish country dance and we learnt some Highland too. In our mid 'teens some of us were recruited into the RSCDS Leeds demo team. I was lucky; friends would drive me to dances all over the north of England, and my knowledge of dancing and life gradually matured.

At St Andrews I had the experience of being taught by Miss Milligan. After university I moved to London. I was on London demo team taught by Bill Ireland. He taught me what a straight line really meant, and what it was to perform as opposed to just dancing well.

I met Wendy, who became my wife, and we had a wonderful time dancing in all manner of venues from iconic London sites in front of Royalty to back street halls with a handful of spectators. The occasion and the place never seemed to matter. The joy was in dancing with friends to the best of our ability to the accompaniment of some great music.

It could not last. The demands of careers and parenthood meant that we withdrew from the dem team. I took on various tasks for London Branch, but I was dancing less. As retirement loomed I decided to get back into it because I believe what we say about the health and well-being benefits of Scottish country dancing. It was a shock. My muscles ached, and I realised the repertoire had moved on in the last 10-15 years. I understood what it must be like for an adult taking to the dance floor for the first time.

After over fifty years of dancing and over forty years as a Society member I was elected Chairman Elect last November. It is a great privilege. Some of the RSCDS "greats" have been there before me and I shall inherit an almost sacred trust of helping to guide the Society as we seek to maintain and grow this wonderful pastime of ours.

Thank you so much for inviting me to your 60th Anniversary celebrations. I am really excited about the occasion, the chance to dance with you, and to make new friends. I am also very keen to hear what you have to say. Toronto is one of our largest branches, with a rich history. You have influ-



ence. How will you continue to succeed? What do you need from me, the Management Board and Committees and the staff at Coates Crescent, and, as importantly, what do you not want us to do? I look forward to finding out, to learning more about you and to sharing your special event. ...Andrew Kellett

Getting to know Jim Stott... Lead teacher at the Workshop I started dancing in 1965. In my career

as a primary teacher, I taught dancing in schools and entered many teams into the Aberdeen Festival. I gained my Full Certificate in 1994.

I taught classes at all levels for Aberdeen Branch and did a term of office as Chair of the Branch.

I've been lucky enough to teach at many Day and Weekend Schools in Britain, Europe, Japan, and North America. I taught at the Australian Winter School in Perth and at our own RSCDS Winter School in Pitlochry, Scotland.

In 2005, I became one of the first Medal Assessors and then an adjudicator in 2007. In 2011 and 2012, I was Depute Director of Summer School



and in 2013 I tutored Unit 5 at St Andrews. I have served on Youth Services, Education & Training, and was two years on the Management Board. I became Schools Director in 2015.

I enjoy teaching dancing and get great pleasure seeing Scottish country dancing continue to thrive all over the world. Last winter, I travelled to Kazan, Russia, to tutor six teacher candidates. This October I taught in Nova Scotia and had the opportunity to attend 5 concerts in the Cape Breton Celtic Colours Festival.

For 14 years I have taught at St Andrews Summer School and for the past two years it was my responsibility and privilege to run the Summer School — a fantastic opportunity to engage with dancers. This year we welcomed over 700 from 40 different countries. Several Torontonians, including three youth, came to St Andrews this summer. I'm eager to reconnect with my Toronto friends, and to make new friends at the November Workshop.

In my life outside of dancing I enjoy painting very much, in both oils and watercolour. My other great love is playing piano, especially with my local music group, the Ythan Fiddlers. We have a rally every year in May, and we've been lucky enough to play gigs in Nova Scotia, North and South Uist, and Orkney.

I've been promised better fish & chips in Toronto than can be had in Scotland. That's a cheeky challenge that must be addressed! ...Jim Stott



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#97 What's in a Name? Lady Peak's Strathspey



am sure that many of us realize that numerous Scottish country dances exist that refer to Lady something or other. It has been my pleasure to cover a few of these British female aristocrats over the past decade or so. But Lady Peak? This is a new one for me. For a brief while I wondered if it might perhaps refer to a Lady of the Peak.

How so? Well, I hail from the English county of Derbyshire, a large portion of which lies within the Peak District. This is in reference to a range of small mountains called the Pennines. By far the most celebrated of British lady

aristocrats within the Peak District has been the Duchess of Devonshire, née Deborah Mitford. Debo, as she was called not only by her family but also by the Queen, was one of the six infamous Mitford sisters. Infamous? I can only suggest you look them up. As a Duchess, Debo lived with the Duke at an imposing manor called Chatsworth House in the Peak District, and as a member of Britain's Youth Hostel Association in my youth, I spent many delightful weekends either cycling or hiking (nowadays known as rambling) throughout the Peak, including visits to Chatsworth where one was guite likely to meet the Duchess somewhere in the grounds.



Now, was Deborah Cavendish, née Mitford, Duchess of Devonshire, the Lady of the Peak? Or, Lady Peak as named in the dance? She died in 2014 at the age of 94, and I cannot confirm any hopes of tying her by name to the aforementioned strathspey. So, will you please excuse me for what has turned out to be rambling preamble. Back to the drawing board!

Lady Peak , in the Cheam Range of the Cascades near Chilliwack, BC.



I checked on the devisor of Lady Peak's Strathspey, a lovely dance, and I should not have been surprised to find the devisor was the iconic John Drewry. Further research led me to British Columbia where, believe it or not, there exists in the Cheam Range of the Canadian Cascades, a 7000 ft mountain called Lady Peak. Locationwise, it's just a little east of Chilliwack and it's well known for its hiking trails. It would not surprise me therefore to learn that, at some point in the 90s, John Drewry made his way out to Vancouver, and being a known rambler, found his way to Lady Peak. The dance was published in 1998 and featured in John's Greenburn Book series. Perhaps John's presence in B.C. at that time can be confirmed by someone at RSCDS Vancouver.

As has been written many times previously, John was born in the English town of Melton Mowbray in Leicestershire, better known for delectable pork pies than for any connection to SCD. Later in life, Drewry became an academic at Aberdeen University in the field of biochemistry and, after having devised over 800 Scottish country dances, he died in 2014 at the age of 90. Set & Link, published a lead story on his life in its February 2009 edition [www.dancescottish.ca/archives-set%26link.html]. It was written by veteran Thornhill dancer, Ross Floyd. Ross and his wife, Dorothy, continue to dance with the Newtonbrook, Petronella, and Richmond Hill social groups.

I cannot recall having seen Lady Peak's Strathspey on any recent RSCDS Toronto dance programmes, but those dancers who travelled recently to RSCDS Kingston for its annual workshop and dance, will have enjoyed working their way through John's lovely formations in Lady Peak's Strathspey, celebrating his likely presence on the mountain in B.C. at some point in the past. Sláinte !

Barry Pipes' column on The Craigellachie Reel prompts more stories. . .

George Will: Dance Devisor ~ Elusive nae more

Pursuant to Barry Pipes' What's in a Name? (Set & Link, Sept. 2017), I have been able to unveil some of the mystery about George Will. Thank you to the following sources for their timely replies to my requests: Simon Scott, Ruth Jappy, and Phyllis Will, Vancouver; Georgina Finlay and Jean Noble, Toronto; Irene Paterson, TAC; Mike Brunnock, Toronto Irish Choral Society; Mike Greenwood and Julia Parr, 12 Coates Crescent*D.E.H*.



Don Mills, Ontario, before being transferred to Vancouver in 1974 by his employer, First City Trust. Born in Bridge of Earn, Scotland, George was an accomplished dancer even as a boy. When he lived in Vancouver, he became a certified SCD teacher, on August 18, 1978. George was a well-rounded musician.

George Will and his wife Phyllis lived in

As a pianist, he could play any type of music either by ear or by reading sheet music. He played in the Schiehallion Band in British Columbia. He and Maureen Collins played piano together, accompanied by Alex Jappy on accordion, and Freddy Collins on percussion. As an organist, George played for several churches in Toronto and Scarborough and later for two United Churches in Vancouver and St. Joseph the Worker, in Richmond.

In Toronto, he occasionally played

piano for the Toronto Irish Choral Society's rehearsals at Neil McNeil High School on Victoria Park Avenue. Mike Brunnock, treasurer and attendance keeper of the TICS, said "George was a faithful bass chorister for five years".

George was a most talented member of the Vancouver Branch of the RSCDS as a dancer, musician, teacher, and dance devisor. Even while very ill in 1991, he still shared in teaching and organizing the Teacher Candidate examinations in Vancouver in March 1991. George died November 6, 1991.

Among his numerous compositions were Bonnie Ina Campbell [Ina was his mother]; The Cooper's Wife, and The Craigellachie Reel, which was danced at Teresa Lockhart's Canada 150 Red & White dance party on June 24, 2017. His skills and personality were shared and enjoyed by many Vancouver dancers as well as dancers in other parts of North America where he was in great demand as a teacher at workshops, including Toronto. Georgina Finlay recalls his advice in his broad Scottish accent to dancers who did not always know where to go: "Stond still and let others dance aboot ya".

RE: The Craigellachie Reel and George Will

When Barry Pipes wrote about George Will, devisor of The Craigellachie Reel, it reminded me of a story about George.

My story relates to the first Teachers' Workshop John and I attended after having passed the RSCDS Preliminary Certificate in 1989. We were, understandably, very nervous to be in a big circle and realize that people on the other side of it were the likes of Bob Blackie and Georgina Finlay, legends we had encountered in our beginner days.

One of the two teachers for this workshop was George Will, SCD teacher from Vancouver, who at that time was making an easy living for himself playing church organs for massive Japanese "destination" weddings in B.C. George endeared himself to me very quickly when we had all been mixed up and then put into sets. My partner was older and never once made eye contact with me, which threw me off badly because we had been repeatedly taught, "LOOK at your partner!"

The dance was Bonnie Ina Campbell. It had been devised by George in response to a complaint from his mother that he had never written a dance for her. (Since it seems that George had run away from home at 14 to escape his mother, this is not surprising.)

The dance eventually was published by the RSCDS as a strathspey but on that fateful day George was teaching it as a reel.

By the time it ended, I was quite mortified but felt vindicated when George, hands folded on his chest and glowering, asked, "Who would like to tell on a partner who never looked at them?"

I never forgot this kindly recognition of a new teacher being let down by an old timer. George Will's untimely death was a loss to Scottish country dancers everywhere.

Scottish Step Lessons

Alma Smith is offering a series of three Scottish Step Classes at Rosedale Presbyterian Church. Nov. 18, 25 and Dec. 2 ~ noon to 1:15 p.m. Scottish Step Dance is a hybrid, with elements of both Highland and Scottish country dance. The genre originated in 19th century Scotland, typically taught to ladies by ballet masters, hence the name "Ladies' Step".

Wes Clindinning

3 November 1933 - 10 September 2017 Irish-born Wesley (Wes) Clindinning was a man of many talents – a Highland dancer for the Toronto Scottish Regiment, a prolific devisor of Scottish country dances, a dance teacher and tutor for potential teacher candidates, and a guest teacher at workshops throughout North America and overseas. He was Chairman of the Teachers' Association (Canada) from

1982 to 1984, during which period he hosted the Silver Jubilee Teachers' AGM Weekend, with the late Anna Holden as Guest Teacher. Wes also established the Silver Jubilee Scholarship Fund, now known as the Jubilee Scholarship Fund, which continues to assist candidates to attend Candidate Classes at TAC Summer School.

Wes, together with Doug Stephen and Jess Bryden, established the West End Workshop, which continues to draw enthusiastic beginner and experienced dancers, to enjoy the teaching of well-known, indemand teachers from the UK, USA, and local areas. Wes was also on a committee of West End teachers who established the still-popular West Toronto Ball, a semi-formal event primarily for new dancers, held every May, with a programme suited to their level of experience.

On a personal note, Wes encouraged me to become a certificated teacher (1979/1980). He allowed me to practise my skills with his beginners, in the first portion of his regular class, which he established in 1972 in Erin Mills. In September 1981, after a separate beginner class with Doug Stephen had been started, Wes left the teaching of the Friday Class to me, but he and Brenda still supported the group by attending regular coffee nights and other special events until they moved to Vancouver Island around 1998 following his retirement. Out west, Wes continued teaching SCD for several years, locally and on nearby Gabriola Island. In September 2012, Erin Mills celebrated its 40th Anniversary with a special dance, and Sharon, Wes's youngest daughter, was Guest of Honour.

Wes loved the music of the dance (a favourite tune was Belladrum House) and he invited musicians to play for classes and special functions whenever possible. Stan Hamilton, Ron Gonella, Ian Powrie, Donald Bartlett, and Fred Moyes all come to mind. He encouraged new teachers, (Keith Bark, Barbara Taylor), and was known world-wide as an excellent exponent of Scottish country dance.

Wes will be remembered for many things, including his sense of humour and his enjoyment of travel and social gatherings. Our thoughts are with Brenda and their three daughters, all of whom shared his love and dedication to spreading the joy of Scottish country dancing.Jean Hamilton
