The Toronto Association published the first version of its newsletter with the new name of Set & Link in January 2005. The name, proposed by Teresa Lockhart, was chosen by popular vote and not only does it recognize a common figure in our dancing, but "link" also reflects the strong

bond of sociability and friendship that comes as a result of being a member of the dance community.

Archived editions of the newsletter are available on the website. In the November 2006 edition, the names of the Set & Link committee are first published. Here we are 13 years later and, with the exception of Carole Bell, who was chair until 2016, these same committee names are appearing in current editions of the newsletter: Donald Holmes, Rob Lockhart, Marian White, Judy Williams - Thank you for your dedication.

The majority of Toronto Association members receive Set & Link via e-mail. Another publication from which all Toronto Association members benefit is the the Society's semi-annual Scottish Country Dancer magazine loaded with information about the worldwide dancing community. We can now also opt to receive it in a digital version. To do so, you need to edit "my profile" on RSCDS.org. Until now it has been delivered to North America by snail mail at a minimum programmes for both CBeebies (under age 6) and CBBC (6-12). cost of £2.75. When you consider that it is mailed to approximately 10,000 addresses within the UK and worldwide, the cost impact is enormous. It might be too late to sign up for a digital October edition, but consider doing so for future editions. If the digital option is not checked, members will continue to receive the paper copy. Apart from the financial savings to the society, give some consideration to the trees.

Social group dancing is already underway, and at the October monthly dance we can reconnect with more of our dancing friends. I am looking forward to seeing you there.


Tartan Honours Scottish Muslims



SCOTTISH CITIZENS PHOTOGRAPHED IN GLASGOW CITY CHAMBERS On September 5, 2019, Laura Morlock, a Canadian professor, from Waterloo University, whose specialty is religious attire, dress, and human rights, tweeted about the official Scottish Islamic Tartan, and she blogged: "I shared a tweet yesterday that Scotland has an official Islamic tartan. It's beautiful, both in concept and in execution. ... This tweet blew up

unlike any other I've ever shared, and I tweet a lot about religious dress (because that's kinda my job). "


The tartan in question had been created seven years ago, to honour Scottish Muslims and to show they are part of the family of the Scottish people – essentially a clan – and thus they needed an official tartan. Scottish academic and *Arab News* columnist Dr. Azeem Ibrahim designed it to celebrate the histories of both Scotland and Islam and to highlight their dual heritage.



The gentleman seated in the promotional image above is a Scottish National Party politician, Humza Yousaf, who was born in Glasgow and in June 2018 was appointed Scotland's Cabinet Secretary for Justice. Muslims have settled in Scotland since the late eighteenth century. Today's figure is estimated at 75,000.

How many Scottish Muslims have danced a Scottish country dance, even *Ramadan-ce*? We don't know. How many Scots have danced a Muslim folk dance or a Singkil, based on the ancient Indian epic *Ramayana* historically performed only by female royalty? We don't know that either. What we do know is that halal integration, known as Halal Scots, entails fitting into society while maintaining religious identity and practices. Quoting Dr. Ibrahim: "Muslim communities in Scotland are particularly sensitive to complexities of culture, race, and religion that are perceived as an integral part of Scottishness." Instead of generating conflict, the five-coloured tartan represents a tightly woven blend of tradition and heritage.

A Spiritual Connection

~ A Demo Pool Adventure ~

The Scots are entertaining the Italians. Arriving early on the day with another dancer, we entered the silent church: St Phillip Neri Parish*. A Franciscan friar, his rough brown habit encircled with rope [a *cincture*, a "girdle of truth"] at the waist, approaches and we ask for directions. He points us to a door: "Try there!" then rushes off to the altar.

Following the sound of loud music, we enter a basement room filled with cheerful Italians celebrating the life of St Francis of Paola.

Our team soon gathers downstairs. We learn we're to dance at the front of the room; also in this space stands a kind of grotto dedicated to St Francis, decorated with green garlands strung with oranges and plaited dough shapes. A small room nearby is for our use. "Please keep the door open all the time," we're told, "or it automatically locks, then we have to hunt for the key."

We review our programme – a strathspey, reels, jigs – and we're ready. The demo is going really well until, that is, the music ignores us poised for beginning bows and curtsies and wickedly charges us straight into the dance. We pause. Technicians huddle. The audience happily waits; it seems people are getting carried away with things Scottish. "Where're your swords?" laughs someone, "What about bagpipes?" asks another. Our leader cheerfully and skillfully enlightens them! The all-clear is then given and away we dance.

For the demo pool it was another successful event in the summer schedule. We were well received and that got me wondering about kindred spirits: Italians praise vino; Scots malt whisky — is this a 'spiritual' connection? Or perhaps simply a shared desire to welcome everyone, have fun, and celebrate the moment. That sums up Scottish country dancing very nicely. ... Sheena Gilks

Dance Dufferin Grove 2019





Simultaneously, attendance at groups and events is weakening as our dance population ages and traffic grows ever more frustrating.

What to do? To help address the ominous reality of rent, I've decided to pay the kitty \$10 at every social group I attend, no matter the stated fee. That's just \$5/hour for an evening of dance. Good value I say!Name withheld




