Dancing, with and without, the Net



**Rob Lockhart writes:** Okay. . . This picture of Georgina Finlay celebrating a significant birthday with *Caber Feigh* on the brink of doom has nothing to do with this article, which is, allegedly, about Scottish country dance resources on the Internet. And yet. . . the picture *is* an appropriate metaphor for those many brave souls – nervous dancers, and new dancers – who gamely took part in the wonderful Festival Day of Dance.

And what, you may wonder, has *THAT* to do with Internet resources? Well, there were some interesting dances demonstrated, weren't there? Where did those dances come from?

Living, as I do, with a teacher, I'm guessing many of the teachers leading the various groups discovered exotic dances by trolling through cyberspace. Yes, there are books aplenty to find dances in, but books are static. If you want to *see* some really neat dances, explore YouTube. There are hundreds of SCD videos posted there, some well danced, some disastrously

flawed, some gob-smacking. Have you seen The Sound Of Music as a Scottish country dance? Be warned, hours will disappear as you 'snoop' through YouTube.

Teresa Lockhart writes... If you're willing to play archeologist and dig around a bit, there are many gems to discover. I look at other Branch sites (especially Boston or New Haven) to check out interesting dances on their programs. Usually, one site links to another, and another, and another. Other Branch newsletters make good reading and tell you what other dancers are up to and many Branch sites now post their own dance videos.

Kiltsandghillies is a lively blog written by Peter Price who shares his teaching joys and woes, and dances, including some of his own devising. Eight by Thirty-Two is a site allowing devisers to post, invite comments on, their new dances.

When looking for a specific dance, I consult ready references such as Minicrib, Strathspey Server, or Ghillie Tracks, to hunt down the dance's original source. Of course, I regularly troll RSCDS.org (Headquarters), TACBooks, and TACSound to stay current with the latest books and music and all kinds of other information.

*Rob again...* If you are a Pilling fan, check out the Frankfurt Scottish Country Dance Club. When they have a ball the 'cribs' are produced as Pilling diagrams!

If you are travelling, RSCDS.org lists Society affiliates world-wide. The Celtic Circle lists *all* groups (affiliated or not) in continental Europe, with live links, and a clickable map.

The most comprehensive web resource for SCD is probably The Strathspey Server, run out of Germany by Scroll of Honour awardée Anselm Lingnau. It isn't pretty, and it's full of geektalk, but it's a treasure chest of SCD info, including an interactive dance database, history, cribs, music suggestions, and lively discussion forums. Teachers use this site a lot but there's plenty to interest dance dilettantes as well.

The Scottish Country Dancing Dictionary website run by Rueben Freemantle and Laurence Abbott out of the UK is another diamond in the rough. It's ugly, and huff-and-puffy, but it has diagrams of formations and tons of info and dance references. I particularly like that the dance cribs posted are linked to YouTube performances that *messrs*. F & A deem to "have some merit". They have panned for gold in the burbling stream of YouTube and come up with the golden nuggets. . . including *Midnight Oil* as danced at Toronto's 2008 Gala Day.

We hope this article has similarly presented some nuggets of value to you. -R & T

### Summer Dancing at Dufferin Grove Branch Award: Keith & Deirdre Bark



 $K_{dre MacCuish}^{eith and Deir-}$ Bark are committed to Scottish Country Dancing and to the Toronto Association. Keith earned his Teacher's Certificate in 1993; Deirdre in 2001. Keith has taught the Erin Mills Tuesday group for twenty years, and together they taught numerous youth and children's classes at Erin Mills. For the

last few years, Deirdre has taught at Woodglen and Humbercrest, our newest social group that is growing steadily. They have taught Branch classes, taught at workshops across North America, and are regular teachers at the annual Thistle Scottish Country Dance School in North Carolina.

Keith is now a recognized tutor of the Society for future SCD teachers. This has required many hours of mainly winter driving for teaching weekends. Deirdre acted as co-pilot for these trips as well as advisor for the local organizers on the intricacies of the examination process. She is a current member of the RSCDS Toronto Teachers' Panel and Keith has been its Chair. He has prepared dance programs for the Toronto Association's year of dancing - a daunting and often unforgiving task.

Their commitment to the standards of SCD teaching has taken them on to the Teachers' Association (Canada) in various roles: Keith as AGM Director, Summer School Director, and Chair of TAC; Deirdre as AGM Director, North American Exam Coordinator, and TAC's Summer School Candidate Course and Examination Coordinator.

Keith was involved in organizing and chairing the West Toronto Ball, and both serve on the Committee for the West Toronto Workshop.

Their involvement in RSCDS Toronto extended to the Association's Board of Directors. Keith served on the Executive Committee and was, in the late 90s, one of the key players in the major transformation that the Toronto Association underwent as a result of our successful Trillium Fund request. He served as Chair (2001-2003) during these proceedings, including the incorporation of the Toronto Association, and all the changes the grant required.

Deirdre served on the Board as the Director for Special Events featuring ceilidhs and galas. They are regularly the Toronto Association's representatives at the Society's AGM in November. Recently, Keith has been seconded to the Membership Services Committee of the Society, a position requiring very early morning meetings via Skype.

The Demo Pool continues to keep them busy: Keith as teacher, dance selector, music organizer, and Deirdre as contact person, program organizer, and general persuader, especially during the busy days of the Robbie Burns Supper season. Many times they are pressed into dancing as well.

Is that all? No, not by a long shot - these are just highlights in the list of contributions this dedicated, generous couple has made to the Scottish country dance community because they love to dance.

### Volunteer Awards ~ Congratulations Josie, Jess, and Marjorie, and a huge "Thank You"!

Josie Dale is a longtime member of Toronto Association, and she has played a significant role with children and their activities at Newtonbrook. She helped Margaret Ann Hunter with her Saturday morning children's



classes for over five years until the classes were unfortunately discontinued this past season.

Josie has played an instrumental role in the ongoing success of the Youth Ball. She is the chief cook. She shops and prepares the food for the meal. As busboy, she sets up the hall tables, finishes preparing the meal, and becomes waitress serving it! Finally, she plays the lead role of proverbial bottle-washer in clean up afterwards. Her long-term, quiet supportive efforts on behalf of Toronto Association activities are very much appreciated.

Jess Houseley, a member of the Toronto Association who dances regularly at Newtonbrook, became leader of Celtic Connections upon the request of the group after their regular teacher retired. To fulfill that role, she honed her teaching skills by attending



Betty Thompson's children's classes at Newtonbrook and many Branch workshops. Many years ago, Jess was involved in organizing and performing Scottish country dancing at the Seniors' Jubilee, in Roy Thomson Hall, a program showcasing senior talent that ran for nineteen years.



Jess organizes Celtic Connections' demonstrations at seniors' homes, and Burns dinners. In June 2003, they performed at the Richmond Hill Tattoo for the 130th Anniversary of the Town of Richmond Hill and the 30th Anniversary of the Richmond Hill Centennial Pipe Band. In 2010, she invited Moira Korus and her Rosedale teenagers to join the demonstration to encourage teenagers to dance and give them experience performing for the public. The climax of that performance was a combination of three distinct forms of dance – Scottish Country, Highland, and Flamenco – which delighted the audience. End-of-season parties at Newtonbrook might include a flamenco dance performed by Jess and her husband Mike.

Also in 2010 she prepared two sets from her group to participate in our Festival of Dance at St. Leonard's Church.

Jess Houseley is dedicated to Scottish country dancing in many forms and settings and is unstinting in her support of dancers of all ages and stages of ability. Her creativity and enthusiasm are contagious and help to spread the news about Scottish country dancing - just what we need. Marjorie Mason has devoted countless hours to our Highlands of Durham Scottish Country Dance group and Scottish country dancing in general. She has been president for ten years and often

when our regular teacher cannot make it. Marjorie has arranged many demos at retirement villages throughout Durham, at Parkwood National Historic Site, The Highlands of Durham Games, and at the Oshawa International Festival.

She is responsible for our group hosting ten Robbie Burns Dinners, which always include Scottish country dancing. She initiated the White Heather Ball and does everything from writing the program, to checking the food, and arranging the tables. These events are very successful and an inspiration to our group, especially new dancers.

Marjorie has guided over twenty tours to Scotland, England, Holland, Ireland, and the US. SCD is always part of her agenda, and she teaches her travellers some simple dances that they can do while touring. She has danced with groups in Ayr and in England and even taught a group of Germans how to do the Highlands of Durham Strathspey while in the pub of the Duntulm Castle Hotel at the northern tip of Skye.

Marjorie's dedication to SCD includes, while at work at The Wee Tartan Shop, sometimes to the owner's chagrin, talking to customers about the benefits of joining a Scottish country dance group.

### What's in a name? Monymusk

Jid you know that just inland from the south coast of Jamaica lies the island's oldest sugar estate, with a distillery where rum is produced? The estate is called Monymusk. It has been in existence in that location since the mid-18th century using labour at that time provided by slaves from West Africa. The Monymusk



Estate was owned by Sir Archibald Grant. Grant? Aha! Methinks I smell a Scottish connection.

A few months ago, the Estate launched a new

brand called MONYMUSK WHITE OVERPROOF RUM, and by volume this product is indeed over-proof to the tune of 63% alcohol. The master blender confirmed that the Monymusk brand name was chosen because of the historical significance of the area. This Monymusk rum is claimed to be a better libation by far than all its competitors. I guess we had better start looking for it in our LCBO stores as a refreshing change of pace from our usual single malt and blended whisky purchases.

And that's it? Indeed no! There's a community in Aberdeenshire called Monymusk. It lies about 15 km northwest of Aberdeen, and is just a bit off the beaten track. It is what is called a planned village within the Monymusk Estate, which is owned by the Grant family. *Planned village* suggests to me something that is purpose-built. For what purpose, I do not know because the village has been there since the 1100s.

Then there is the Monymusk Reliquary, which, as we all know, is a container for relics. This particular reliquary was made about 750 A.D. probably by monks from Iona and is said to contain holy relics of St. Columba. It became a sacred item used for saintly assistance by Scots in battle. It

came into the possession of the Grant family and is now in the care of the National Museum of Scotland in Edinburgh as one of its most prized pieces.

It is there that Wm. Grant & Sons distill some great products under the name Glenfiddich and The Balvenie.

Anything else? Well yes, there is an old folk-tune called *Monymusk Lads* which starts...

As I cam' in by Monymusk, and doon by Alford dale,

A sad misfortune happened to me, and I think nae shame to tell.

Can it be sung perhaps in support of that lovely smooth-flowing strathspey called *Monymusk*? Or could it be best danced to a Jamaican reggae beat?

Whatever. . . here is a plug for the Highlands of Durham SCD's White Heather Ball on June 23 detailed elsewhere in this S & L. The *Monymusk* strathspey is on the program!

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
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
