Kathleen Kynoch: An Affa' Fine Quine!



By Donald E. Holmes athleen was born in Aberdeen, Scotland, to Richard and Christina Esson. She has four older siblings: Richard, Netta, Doris, and Bella.

At an early age, along with her three sisters, she took dance lessons in tap, highland, and ballet. During the Second World War, these four girls participated in a concert party entertaining the troops (Elma Grech was the pianist). Kathleen sang for, and they all danced at various charity events in Aberdeenshire for the War Effort.

Ever athletic, Kathleen and three other girls formed the Caledonian Ladies' Cycling Club. They trained, raced time trials of 10, 25, and 50 miles, and Kathleen won the trophy for the BAR (best all rounder) in 1950, 1951, and 1952.

Through cycling, she met her husband Jim, also a champion cyclist. They were married on October 17, 1953, and both continued cycling until they

came to Canada in 1957. While their competitive cycling ended with their arrival in Canada, they enjoyed 25 annual reunions across Canada and the USA with their cycling pals.

When the Kynochs emigrated to Canada, Elma was playing for Bob Millar's East York Scottish Country Dancers. There they started Scottish country dancing, took Branch classes, and were members in one of the East York demonstration teams. Kathleen took her Preliminary Teacher's exam in 1979 and her full certificate at Brock University in 1980, together with Jean Hamilton and Jean Noble.

Having taught many classes in Canada and the United States, she thoroughly enjoyed teaching Branch classes at all levels: Beginner, Intermediate, and Advanced as they were known in those days. "The time I spent teaching footwork, technique, and handing is very rewarding when I see some of my former pupils performing the lessons I had taught them."

"I began by teaching a social group at Unionville that continued for four years. For a short while, I substituted for Jim Stephen at Hart Lake in Brampton. Later, Betty Thompson (Newtonbrook) asked me to share her class, and we did that successfully from 1986 to 2001. When Betty was unable to continue, I assumed the full-time teaching in 2002. They are a wonderful group of dancers and have been very kind and faithful to me." She was on the original Teachers' Panel from 1994 to 1996. Her classes are fun. She leads newer dancers alongside veterans in a relaxed, enjoyable atmosphere.

In her non-dancing spare time, she teaches Tai Chi in Thornhill. Being Scottish, however, her affinity for golf, if not genetic, is undeniably deep rooted. She joined the Ladies' Golf Club of Toronto in 1966 and served as its Captain. She sat on the Board of Directors twice: first as Finance Chairman; later, as Course Chairman. From 1987 to 1988, she was Chairman of the York District Golf Association, representing 14 different clubs. She was PR Director for the Ontario Ladies' Golf Association (1989-1990), and Scoring Chairman at the Canadian Open Championship at Glen Abbey (1977-2000). "I could not have done any of this volunteer work without the wonderful and encouraging support from my late husband Jim." "Weel, michty me, ah'll hae tae feenish noo or we'll be here aa nicht!" †

Deservedly, she had a great honour bestowed on her on February 18, 2009, when she was made an Honorary Life Member of the Ladies' Golf Club - being one of only two golfers so endorsed in the club's history. She's an affa' fine quine, and a rare spikkar an' a.' ††


Official Notification: Fees

Remembering Frances Gray

ecently I learned of Frances
Gray's battle with cancer and her passing away, peacefully, on February 28, 2013.

Frances graced my life briefly during a time when I was a member of the Calvin Scottish Country Dance Group. As a young person, I began Scottish dancing with Betty Thompson and later went on to dance with Grace Harris. I was encouraged to join the Calvin group many

years later by my dear friend, Nancy Stokes, who has been the treasurer of Calvin for many years.

I think that Frances was the best dancing teacher I ever had. She was a very gracious and generous person and this was evident in the way she taught her classes. They always began with a good warm up and then the formation of sets. She had a soft, lyrical voice which I think she used to her advantage as we would all have to quit chatting in our lines, knuckle down, and listen carefully if we wanted to know what to do! In truth, she rarely had to call us to attention because she commanded it, in her quiet way. She taught her classes with a firm, steady hand, sprinkled with kindness and an excellent sense of humour. I remember laughing a lot during Frances' classes. She was always encouraging – even when we got it hopelessly wrong! A word that springs to mind is unflappable. I don't think I ever saw Frances get upset even under the most trying circumstances; we just started again until we got it right.

I distinctly remember Frances asking to speak with me after class one day and wondering what it could be about. She said that she thought I should introduce my daughter to Scottish country dancing and she recommended I contact the Rosedale Group. Funnily enough, this had not occurred to me before, and since the suggestion came from Frances I set about making inquiries right away! My lovely daughter, Jane, has been dancing ever since, and I have had the tremendous pleasure of watching her discover a love of Scottish country dancing.

I was in attendance at the 50th anniversary of the Calvin group and, as usual, Frances was guiding the group in her warm and purposeful way. She was incredibly dedicated and taught the group for nearly 30 years. She was also the Chair of the Toronto branch. She was the first Canadian examiner for the RSCDS, touring and evaluating dance teachers in Canada, USA, Peru, and Australia. She was awarded the RSCDS Scroll of Honour in 2001. Frances Millar Gray will be greatly missed and I wish her God's grace.

Carole Bell's Reminiscence of Frances

n the 1980s I enrolled in a Board of Education Scottish country dance class that was taught by Frances. Sometimes during the winter months, we would have only seven dancers. One night my husband, Ron Bell, who had never heard of SCD, accompanied me to class. "Just in case we need you," I claimed, "and all you have to do is be a place holder." He said later that the minute he heard the music he was hooked. Frances' gentle, encouraging ways made the classes a delight for both of us, with the result that 25 years later we are still enthusiastic dancers. Thank you, Frances.

What's in a Name: The Diamond Jubilee

hat a great idea to finally feature this excellent jig called *The Diamond Jubilee* at the April Monthly Dance, following all the celebrations surrounding last year's 60th anniversary of the reign of Queen Elizabeth II throughout the UK and Commonwealth. What with medals being awarded

Commonwealth. What with medals being awarded to dancers we know (see below), it would be hard not to be aware of the significance of the event. . . Royalist beliefs or not!



But what's this? I look again and see that *The Diamond Jubilee* dance first appeared in RSCDS Book 31, and that was published way back in 1984. Also appended to the dance name in some quarters was reference to the 60-year stretch from 1923 to 1983. So. . . to which royal personage could that time span refer? It certainly wasn't the Queen or her father

King George VI. He came to the throne long after 1923 and died in 1952. While there's no shortage in Europe of royal families (in waiting!), we don't keep track of them with the same adulation with which some follow the activities of the Windsors.

Does 1923 perhaps ring some other form of bell as the start of something big? Well, of course, we knew all the time, didn't we? It was in 1923 that two forthright Scottish ladies, Jean Milligan and Ysobel Stewart of Fasnacloich, decided to found the Scottish Country Dance Society, the reasons for which have been adequately documented in these pages in the past. The Royal addition to this Society's name came later in the fifties with the strong support of the aforementioned Queen Elizabeth II who, in her day, was quite an accomplished Scottish country dancer. Needless to say, we all continue to be the beneficiaries of that important day in 1923.

Back to the dance! *The Diamond Jubilee* was devised by one Robert Campbell of the Oakville Scottish Country Dancers. That's Ontario's Oakville, folks, just down the QEW from Toronto. Robert likely would have been quite well known to a number of RSCDS Toronto dancers, especially the veterans.

It is my opinion about *The Diamond Jubilee* that this jig has a lovely flow, and is well recommended as a selection for the April Monthly Dance.

Most of our dancing life Pat and I danced at our social group – adding the occasional monthly dance. Our routine is to join RSCDS Toronto at the beginning of the dancing year. Some say membership fees are a problem. I don't think so. It's more a matter of group ethos.

Nonetheless, I have been looking at our Toronto Association membership fees wondering if they are a bit high. Two-thirds of us now have a membership with email Set&Link. We pay your dues to Edinburgh. True – Edinburgh has just added £1 to its annual base fee, now £16. But the pound costs less than it did a few years ago. Even though budgeting is messy, I hope there can be a simpler fee structure to go with a more enticing sign-up form so that more dancers will join RSCDS Toronto Association. It may take time, but I have been looking at this. In the meantime ...
