


Bobby Drew joined hundreds of tartaned revellers to celebrate this proud Scottish event.

A Mother's Love

s I approach Mother's Day and the West Toronto Ball, my thoughts turn to last year. The 2012 West Toronto Ball would be the first time I'd sparkle at a SCD ball in a gown from my mother's collection. Yet it would also be the last time for Mother to see me off to a grand evening of Scottish country dancing.



With more than half a century to its credit, my mother's vintage gown was her own creation. She even designed the pattern, drawing inspiration from the simple classic lines of the 1950s that marked the gowns of British royals. In 1967 Mother appeared on my father's arm at a Ukrainian fundraiser at the King Edward Hotel wearing this gown. She was the belle of the ball! It is now time to fast forward to May of 2012. It is the day of the ball, 4:30 p.m.! I show myself downstairs, dressed in my mother's gown. The emotion of the moment is captured in my mother's eyes. I see a mother's joy. I feel a mother's pride. But I also sense a hint of disbelief -"So do our minutes hasten to their end; Each changing place with that which goes before."

Oh, the swift passage of the years!

Three months earlier... Mother is raced to hospital with congestive heart failure. It's the morning of the 49th Tartan Ball and I spend fourteen continuous hours at her side. As her condition improves, Mother feels wretched and guilty. "You're not dancing tonight, and it's all because of me." "Nonsense," I say. "I've been dancing in my head and the best part is I'm here to enjoy it with you!"

It was Mother who started me off on the road to dance – classical ballet at age 5! At university I picked up ballroom. Years later I even made a foray into Renaissance dance at the ROM.

When I took up SCD three years ago, Mother noticed a transformation. As the days went by, I seemed to become a happier person. I'm so pleased that Mother was well enough to share an evening of SCD with me – and so many of you – at the family dance in December 2010.

A couple of months later, when I came home after my beginner's class, I noticed a sheet of paper face down on the kitchen table. It was a poem, written in Ukrainian, dedicated to me on my birthday. I went to the dining room and gave Mother a hug. I told her it was the best gift she had ever given me. What is it that makes my mother's



poem so special? Written from the heart, it is testament to her recognition of the joy and happiness I derive from Scottish country dancing.

Mother passed away less than three months after the 2012 West Toronto Ball. This Mother's Day, in tribute to my mother's love, I wish to share my mother's poem (my translation) with you – my Scottish country dancing family. Halyna Sydorenko

To my dear daughter Halyna, on your birthday:

Your love of dancing reappears

To light a new desire,

From sprightly babe to five score years

The Scottish heart's afire!

As one of many in a group

You step to music's reeling,

Rev. Canon Robert Bruce Mutch

What's in a Name: The Gardeners' Fantasia

t the outset, let me admit that I had barely heard of this dance out of RSCDS Book 46 until I saw it included in the West Toronto Ball program for May 11, 2013. Throughout my adult life, I have masqueraded as a gardener of sorts, which over the years in southern Ontario has presented plenty of problems, usually weather-related. So when this three-couple strathspey known as *The Gardeners' Fantasia* surfaced as a program selection, I was hooked.



As I guess many of us may know, "fantasia" seems to have been a coined word used by the Walt Disney organization to celebrate a film by the same name launched in the 1940s. The

film was an animated presentation (Mickey Mouse and all) of quite a number of well-known classical music works played by the Philadelphia Orchestra under

the baton of Maestro Leopold Stokowski. I am given to understand it had a mesmerizing effect on its audiences, and although it was never awarded an Oscar, did receive a great deal

of special accolades...a fantasy indeed.

But a gardeners' fantasy? And/or a connection to Scottish country dancing? Beats me! The dance was devised by a lady or gentleman named P. Cook, and I'd be grateful if someone somewhere could enlighten me as to the full identity of Mr., Mrs., Ms, or Dr. P. Cook. Just for the record, you know!

Meanwhile, while any amateur gardener in my neighbourhood can grow busy lizzies a.k.a. impatiens in their back yards, my fantasy leans in the direction of trying to grow the more complex varieties of perennial—hardier versions of which are now available from local nurseries.

All that said, however, devisor Cook may in this dance simply be referring to family friends who go by the name Gardener, which throws my whole column on to the composting heap.

Wait! I do have a final thought. As I investigated this dance, I came upon an intriguing new method of demonstrating SCD on YouTube.



It's called DancieMaetion. No, that is not a typo! DancieMaetion is a process to create animated characters that perform Scottish country dances along with a voiceover. There is an animation for *The Gardeners' Fantasia*. I recommend you check it out. You might well like it!

Michael Moon: Scotiaphile



In January 2013, Tom Clark received an email from Rexford Leonard offering, as holder of the Power of Attorney for "a dear friend who has become severely disabled due to MS with a very limited memory now", to donate a collection of Scottish tartans and reference books on clans and tartans to the Toronto Association.

Rexford Leonard sent us the following biography of his friend Michael.

He was born Michael McDonald and

adopted into the Moon family near Godfrey, Ontario, as a young boy. "With Scottish ancestry on both sides of his adopted family (Craig and Crawford grandparents) along with his original McDonald family name, he didn't have to look far for encouragement as a Scotiaphile." This eventually led to a love for tartans in particular, and he began his collection with his own family clan connections. Fascinated by the beautiful and seemingly endless colour combinations (he was a natural born artist), Michael soon progressed to collecting many different tartans, attracted by the histories of a clan, the unique colours, and the weight and feel of genuine Scottish wool. This is not a cheap hobby (as anyone who has purchased genuine Scottish wool tartan will know), so he collected his favourites one at a time as finances permitted, and eventually invested in two kilts as well (MacDonald Dress and Cape Breton) — and "quite a few" neckties!

After Michael was diagnosed with MS in 1996, his tartan collection became even more important to him as a way of focusing on something positive beyond his own problems and the difficulties of his disability. It was both a diversion and an inspiration. Unfortunately, by 2002 his condition had progressed to the point where he needed to be admitted permanently to hospital, and as he has further deteriorated over the years it became apparent that a large tartan collection was no longer practical, nor a priority in his life.

While he kept his own family clan tartans (as well as some provincial favourites and of course the Royal Stewart), it just seemed to make sense to find a good home for the bulk of his collection and the investment of time and money they represent. The opportunity of passing his "treasures" on to the RSCDS is a wonderful way to honour Michael and his love for Scottish history and culture.

RSCDS Toronto appreciates this thoughtful and generous donation. Some of the pieces will be remade into vests for our Demo team. Others will be available as banners and table coverings. Some pieces will be on offer at our 'Gently Used Scottish Clothing and Such Sale' at the workshop in November.

Used Batteries Campaign Over

Me-To-We has ended its used household battery campaign. In that project, zinc was extracted from the used batteries and recycled with the assistance of a health agency to make capsules for children in third world countries who were suffering from diarrhea. There is sufficient zinc in one battery to treat six children, so from the 6514 batteries I collected from St.

Clement's parishioners and from Scottish Country dancers, 39,084 capsules were made available.

Because of the foregoing decision by Me-To-We, I will no longer be collecting batteries. Thanks to everyone who brought used batteries for supporting this program while it was in operation.

Dennis Lam, Supervisor of Toronto's Household Hazardous Waste, says that batteries can be taken to any one of the six Hazardous Waste Depots (Transfer Stations) where they are sorted and contracted out to recover as many metals as possible, including steel from the battery casing. The contractor is Raw Materials Inc. in Port Colbourne: www.rawmaterials.com. Contact Mr. Lam at www.toronto.ca/311.

Since batteries are not collected with garbage and recyclables because they contain toxic materials, they are to be disposed of with caution. One alternative is the Orange Drop program MaketheDrop.ca, which operates under the Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR). It began on July 2, 2010, and includes thousands of products in many categories. Businesses that produce products are now responsible for recovering the cost of collecting them once the customer has finished using them. Google Orange Drop to locate drop-off sites close to your home by entering your postal code.



Monthly Dances in Review

Of the six monthly dances this year, five were held in the evening. We broke with tradition by holding the January dance in the afternoon. 





AGM Awards & Recognitions
