From the Chair

We are trying something new with the Level 3 class—pay as you attend. We understand that experienced dancers may not have the opportunity to attend all classes but want to improve their technique. This is important for members considering, and for those in the process of achieving, a teacher certificate.

"There is always joy in sharing a passion, and I do want to inspire the joy of dancing." Maureen Richardson, daughter of Jean Millar of Arbroath, Scotland, and Maurice (Rick) Richardson of Eastleigh, England, was born in Toronto and holds one of the longest records of any teacher currently teaching SCD in Toronto — 41 years of dedicated service! She began dancing at age four with Anne MacLeod and Isabelle MacPherson at Calvin Presbyterian Church where Jean Anderson accompanied the class on piano. Later, she attended Rosedale Presbyterian Church under the teaching of Grace Harris. Maureen's 92-year-old father, a rear gunner for the RAF during World War II and now living in Richmond Hill, still enjoys the "old dance tunes of yesteryear." Maureen's mother died at a young age, so she and her sister Rosemary were brought up by

maternal aunts and their maternal grandmother (also Jean Millar), introducing them to piano and Scottish country dance evenings in their home with Jean at the piano.

Scottish country dancing is a life-long passion for Maureen: "It was always inspiring to interact with other dancers and their parents, teachers, adjudicators, and spectators at various functions. Dancing has always been such an important part of my life, and I can't imagine not being involved in some capacity." She met many of the teachers who influenced SCD in Toronto and area: Sandy Bain, Iain MacFarlane, Ian McCaffey, Sandra Binns, Bob Miller, Bob Blackie, Frances Gray, Jean Noble, Georgina Finlay, Janette Todd, and Betty Thompson.

Maureen received her Preliminary Certificate in 1969 and her Full Certificate in 1972 from Miss Milligan. "It was stressful, but I have no regrets," she says. She taught children at Rosedale and followed Grace Harris to St. Clement's Church where she taught until 1983. She moved to King Township to raise her two sons and taught SCD as an extra-curricular activity in Kleinburg Public School where she was a member of the faculty.

After 13 years teaching Core French in Toronto (Regal Road, Pape Avenue, and Leslie Street public schools) and 19 years in York Region, she retired in 2008. Her love of the classroom is still extraordinary: "There was not a day that I did not want to be with my students, and I consider it a privilege to have had the opportunity to teach such wonderful children throughout those years. Many of them still keep in touch."

Maureen's late husband, Gordon Fogg, played the piano, organ, guitar, banjo, and mandolin, and spent his entire career in the marketing and sales sector of the musical instrument industry. Their two sons, Gordon and Sean, are also entrepreneurs, but of the four, Maureen was the only one with a passion for dance. Her unwavering commitment to it continues as she currently teaches four SCD classes: a social group in Brampton, an Association class for beginners at Eastminster United Church in Toronto, a social group at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in Aurora, and a social group at Knox Presbyterian Church in Alliston — and she will teach the West End Workshop in March. She also currently acts as secretary for the Toronto Teachers' Panel.

She participated in demonstrations at Massey Hall, O'Keefe Centre, Exhibition Place, SkyDome, Orillia Scottish Festival, Burns' dinners, in addition to years of competitions as a youth and adolescent. In her spare time now, she plays piano and violin, participates in the Nobleton Book Club, curls, and on four occasions has led weddings guests through a set of dances. Maureen has also sung in choirs and does community volunteerism.

She says: "I consider myself blessed in so many ways."

Rosemary & Vaness model Saltire Chic A Bit of Home in Hannover

Rosedale alumnus, Hilary Keachie, is working in Hannover, Germany, as Project Coordinator for the Inter-religious Youth Forum 2015, an international and interfaith initiative that will bring together 100 young leaders from over 20 countries for a week of learning, dialogue, and social action. The Youth Forum takes place May 23-30, 2015, in Stuttgart, Germany, to coincide with the 10th annual Religious Leaders' Summit and the 35th Protestant Kirchentag.



Moving across the ocean to Germany last January was definitely an adjustment. I didn't speak the language; I didn't know anyone (except for one acquaintance — 300 km away), and I had only an inkling as to what my job actually entailed. The first weeks were full of new people, new food, new pronunciation —basically a whole lot of "new" to wrap my head around. And that was why I was so excited, and surprised, to find a Scottish country dance group in Hannover. I had never even *imagined* being able to dance here, something I have been doing more or less continuously, both in the Country and Highland varieties, since I joined Rosedale Children's Group when I was three years old.

The group in Hannover meets every Tuesday evening at a small, unassuming community centre and assembles an interesting mix of German and foreign dancers, many from the Netherlands. It's a small group, between 8 and 10 people on an average week, but their passion and enjoyment for Scottish dancing are clearly evident, and definitely one of the reasons I keep going back. Even though the skill level is quite basic, and I sometimes wince at their pas-de-Basques attempts, everyone is eager to try new formations and steps, and puts in significant effort to decode the complicated English briefings. It is actually quite hilarious to listen to the mash-up of German and English as we try and work our way through what exactly a "Tourbillon" is. It inevitably ends in laughter.

After an hour and a half of dancing, we often gather at a table to chat and share delicious treats. It seems like it's always someone's birthday or some other occasion to celebrate and so, almost weekly, we drink sparkling wine or cider and sing "Viel Glück und viel Segen, auf all deinen Wegen, Gesundheit und Frohsinn, Sei auch mit dabei'** (sort of the German equivalent to Happy Birthday, but also sung for any occasion that calls for good wishes).

All in all, it's a thoroughly enjoyable weekly tradition, a true mix of German and Scottish cultures, and one I have to say I will deeply miss when I return to Canada in January. Thankfully I will have lots of other dancing opportunities to look forward to! ... *Hilary*

What's in a Name? Keppoch's Rant

K eppoch? Now there's a word that I have not heard before. I am reminded that there still exists an abundance of Scottish history and culture with which I am still insufficiently acquainted. What do I find? Keppoch seems to be a derivation of the Gaelic word *Ceapaich*, which translates simply as "a plot of land". My further findings tie Keppoch to Clan Donald, in that the MacDonalds of Keppoch earned historic renown as a branch of that clan.

It all seems to go back to one Alasdair Carragh (in Gaelic: pillar of strength), although he was more frequently known by the less salubrious surname

MacDonald of Keppoch

Carrach, which means "scruffy". Alasdair seems to be closely associated with the founding of the Keppoch MacDonalds, and was a grandson of King Robert II, the first of the Stewart kings, who brought about what I have seen described in historical references as "evil consequences"

and "a heritage of woe on Scotland" due to his many conjugal relationships. They resulted in Robert siring 21 offspring who in turn were said to be responsible for numerous subsequent problems in maintaining a royal line of succession. Worth noting is that the current Chief of Keppoch challenges the accuracy of these past historic references and is in the process of having them rewritten.

All of which is to say that a history of the Keppochs is highly complex but may well be somewhat fanciful. Despite the foregoing, the MacDonalds of Keppoch were staunch supporters of Scottish independence over the centuries and spilled much blood at Bannockburn and Culloden plus a host of battles in between.

Now let's get back to the dance...

Puzzling to me is that while one might expect *Keppoch's Rant* to be a lively dance, it is in fact a strathspey. I am a little bemused as to how that can be. My trusty *OED* defines a rant as a "high-flown, extravagant, or bombastic speech or utterance". To rant is "to rave or talk foolishly". My *Dictionary of Scottish Dialect* includes the word "ranty" to mean lively, cheerful, or gay. These are words to describe a strathspey? Could it be that the Keppoch MacDonalds, much like the Robertsons whose strathspey is also described as a rant, are in fact a far more sober, restrained group of Highlanders than we might expect?

Whatever, you can give it a shot at the RSCDS Toronto Monthly Afternoon Dance on November 9, 2013. But if you do, please try to inject some extra life into it!
