

From the Chair...



Pring was certainly evident for our March Beginners' Dance. It was an energetic night for 161 dancers on the floor including 34 beginners from various classes, with spring in their step. Thanks go to the teachers who have

worked hard with those dancers and to Forbes and his committee, responsible for the smooth running of the event.

The dances originally collected by the Society were traditional country dances historically danced in Scotland. After WW2 with Book 13 (The Victory Book), recently devised dances were added, The Reel of the 51st Division (also called The St Valery Reel) being the first of these.

Many of the traditional dances reflect an event or person in Scottish history. In particular, April brings us to the Jacobite rebellions in Scotland. The battle of Culloden was fought in 1746 between the supporters of the Stewart kings and the Government forces. It was the last battle fought on British soil.

The Jacobite emblem, a rosette of white ribbons worn as a cap badge, was celebrated in a song by Robert Burns and in a reel, *The White Cockade*, by one of the many dancing masters in the 18th and 19th centuries. *The Duke is Welcome to Inverness* refers to the Duke of Cumberland. Welcome, one wonders, to whom — he's also known locally as Butcher Cumberland. Memories are long in the Highlands. The Gaelic Society of Inverness leads a Gaelic service of Remembrance every April at the Culloden Memorial cairn. Other historically inspired dances include The Wild Geese (Irish mercenaries who fought for the Jacobites) and Lochiel's Rant (Donald Cameron of Lochiel).

Many of these old dances still appear regularly on our programmes.

Join us at the Volunteer Dance on April 9, where the Toronto Association shows appreciation to those who keep the association running in a healthy condition. Volunteers make up about 45% of our membership. Director Wayne Fraser, with his committee, plan a lively evening.

The joys of Summer School



What's in a Name?


If you were able to attend our March Monthly Dance, did you have the chance to sample that very nice and smooth flowing reel called *Currie Mountain?* It was devised quite a while ago by Mary Pugh, a Fredericton dancer, and was one of her submissions to the *New Brunswick Collection*. This bicentennial collection of reels, jigs, and strathspeys was created to celebrate the 200th anniversary of the province's founding in 1784.

While you may never have heard of such a place as Currie Mountain, it looms over the city of Fredericton, in a manner of speaking, and originated as a volcano eons ago. Any likelihood of an imminent eruption? Hardly! In fact, if they were to think about any form of local catastrophe, the citizens of Fredericton would be far more likely in the short term to be inundated by flooding from the Saint John River (Yes! *That* Saint John River!) which flows through the city and actually runs quite close to the base of this mountain.

Truth be known, even though the volcanic origin of Currie

Mountain and its environs goes back around 100 million years, there still exists visible evidence of what were once flowing lava beds which in turn have been responsible for the growth of any number of quite rare plants, found nowhere else in the area.

Here is another anomaly! Currie Mountain has a height of about 87 metres, and for those of us metrically challenged folks who are several decades away from school learning, 87 metres tops out at say, a little under 300 feet. But there again, as I am sure that you will agree, to give this non-alpine eminence the appellation Currie Hill does not have quite the same cachet.



Mentioning rare plants, could that mean plants like cumin or coriander? Well no, as tropical plants, they refer to curry (the food dish). Currie (the mountain) is named for one of the original owners who bequeathed this piece of property to the University of New Brunswick at least 50 years ago. But let's not forget that in itself, Currie is a well established Scots name, which stems from the Gaelic MacMhuirich, which perhaps gives this whole review a little extra panache.

I had the pleasure of chatting with Mary Pugh by phone recently in which she not only provided me with helpful information about Currie Mountain, but told me about her dancing opportunities in Boston, an SCD Branch that I believe has an equivalent annual event to our Tartan Ball, and attracts numerous Canadian dancers from the Maritime Provinces. It turns out that Mary had also had the opportunity to visit Toronto for a Tartan Ball some years ago.

In closing, I would like to thank not only Mary Pugh for her support of this submission, but also Connie Moore, who was my initial contact at RSCDS Fredericton and enabled me to reach Mary.

Automated External Defibrillator

= Heart Rescue

If you see someone collapse suddenly...what should you do?

Many venues now have AEDs, a portable medical device that delivers an electrical shock to restart a person's heart. Most of us have some fear of using them, even in an emergency. Your Board (and fellow dancers) want you to know what to do in an emergency. Under Ontario law, the Chase McEachern Act (Heart Defibrillator Civil Liability) 2007, you will not be liable for damages resulting from attempting to help someone (unless your actions are for profit or you are grossly negligent).



TYPICAL AED



The Three Easy Steps of the Procedure:

Call 911 Have them send help. Stay on line and listen for further instructions.



Start Chest Compressions If the person is not breathing normally, start chest compressions. Push down hard and fast in the centre of the chest. Keep your arms straight. Send someone to find an AED.



Use the AED The Automated External Defibrillator provides voice prompts that tell you exactly what to do and it will only administer a shock if needed, so there's no reason to hesitate
