Here We Go . . . Boldly Into the Future

In August 2012, a Steering Committee of the Board (Margaret Rieger, John Clark, and Jean Lindsay) met with Ron Purcell of Roncell Marketing to develop a strategic plan for RSCDS Toronto. Ron volunteers his services as a consultant under the auspices of Management Advisory Services. For a donation, this organization provides not-for-profits and charitable organizations with consulting services as requested.

In September, Ron sent surveys he developed to randomly chosen Toronto Association members and tabulated their responses. All members who received a survey completed it. Eighteen TA members, including the Board, were invited to participate in a two-day workshop in November to review the results, to identify and discuss the changing trends in which we operate, and to develop a strategic plan for the next 5 years.

Trends identified include:

- ▶ a growing population of 55+
- ▶ an increase in the use of technology in everyday life
- ▶ an increasingly diverse population
- ▶ an increase in the number of choices of activities, lifestyle expectations and definitions of retirees, families and youth
- ▶ changing government procedures and regulations
- ▶ changing tastes in music and modes of delivery
- ▶ fewer volunteers

Led by Ron, workshop participants formulated and recommended a new Mission Statement (inset) and goals to achieve this stated purpose. These have been approved by the Board.

Mission Statement
As one of the world's largest Scottish country dance branches, we lead and coordinate promotion and delivery of SCD events, programs, and training, which

- **are welcoming, enjoyable, and appropriate for participants of all ages, and levels of ability**
- **provide the mental, social, and physical benefits of SCD while maintaining the standards of the SCD form of dance.**

Priority Goals to develop and implement, as approved by the Board:

- ▶ **Communications:** Strategies to increase effectiveness with/between the membership
- ▶ **Marketing:** Strategies to promote Scottish Country Dancing
- ▶ **Beginner Integration:** Strategies to integrate beginners into the world of SCD
- ▶ **Skill Development:** A plan to improve the understanding of the stages required to achieve proficiency in SCD
- ▶ **Organization & Procedures:** Strategies to increase efficiency, effectiveness and coordination of procedures
- ▶ **Maintain and Support Standards:** Strategies to ensure consistency of SCD standards/experience and availability of qualified teaching resources
- ▶ **Recruitment & Retention:** Strategies to increase and maintain membership
- ▶ **Membership Support:** Strategies to accommodate the changing needs of members
- ▶ **Sustainable Funding:** Strategies to ensure sustainable cash flow to support the above initiatives

This planning exercise is the beginning of an ongoing effort by the Board to ensure that the fun and enjoyment, as well as the mental, social, and physical benefits, of Dancing Scottish are shared by all.



Wearing a sash to the Tartan Ball?

Ladies often adorn their ball gown with a colourful tartan sash, typically fastened with a lovely cairngorm brooch and / or a pleated rosette. The question often arises: Which shoulder?

Lord Lyon King of Arms, the arbiter of all matters heraldic, endorses the tradition that ladies should wear the sash *dexter* – i.e. over the the right shoulder.

Certain *Very Important Ladies* may wear a *sinister* sash – over the left shoulder. Such ladies of gravitas may include the wife of a clan chief, or the spouse of a senior officer of a Scottish regiment, and, of course, the Queen of Great Britain!

However, a review of photos from Tartan Balls past (and other events) shows a definite Toronto preference for the left shoulder. Perhaps because all ladies in Toronto are *Very Important Persons*.

Stop-Start Your Way to Fitness

On August 10, 2012, *heraldscotland* reported on a team of researchers, including Sabita Stewart, a NHS physiotherapist, which carried out a project looking at activities that improve bone health and help to prevent osteoporosis. Stewart said: "There are studies coming to light showing that, while running is good for you in terms of being out in the fresh air and has benefits for the heart, in terms of bone health and impact it's maybe not as good as something like Scottish country dancing which is stop-start."

What's in a Name? *Waverley* (Fergus McIver)

Glaswegians may surmise that this will be the story of a vessel that sails regularly up and down the Firth of Clyde, perhaps from the Broomielaw, loaded with day-trippers. Called *Waverley*, it is said to be the last remaining passenger-carrying paddle wheel steamer in existence. No. . . I'm talking about a different *Waverley*! I did that story quite some time ago in connection with a piece about *The Rothesay Rant*.

name. Incidentally, the correct clan name as far as I can tell is MacIver, not McIver or even Mac-Ivor as is indicated in written outlines of the book.

There's much more to the story for you to check. It is likely available among the classics at your local book store...but what about the dance itself? It is one of those sometimes tiring 48 bar jigs...starts with a chase (meh!) but includes a foot-tangling move in which one transitions from a pousette into double triangles. It is on the upcoming Tartan Ball program so we hope that you will have found the determination and fortitude to try it first.

It is not clear who devised the thing. It appeared in RSCDS Book 15, which would take it back several decades or so. There is a reference to Messrs. Button and Whitaker, London music publishers in the early 19th century.

Finally, for those who wish they could avoid the pousette/ double triangles entanglement, Hugh Foss did devise a dance called *Fugal Fergus* which is a variation on *Waverley* that might be considered less challenging.

Those of us familiar with the works of Sir Walter Scott will be well aware of his series of novels about Edward Waverley, an officer in the English army of the Hanoverian king, George II. Edward is posted to Perthshire but ultimately finds himself involved in the 1745 Jacobite unpleasantries. It transpires that Edward's family has Jacobite tendencies and in consequence is unsupportive of the king, who in any event was far from popular with English citizens at large.

In due course, Waverley finds himself drawn into the Jacobite cause. Needless to say, the charms of a young lady named Rose also come into play. The developing

intrigue takes Edward into the realm of Clan Mac-Ivor, whose Chief, Fergus, is active in fomenting the upcoming rebellion... hence the parenthetical inclusion of Fergus McIver in the dance

George Glen Young




Feb. 20, 1935 – Jan. 5, 2013

Glen was a professional musician who emigrated to Canada from Clackmannan, Scotland, in 1958. He was a 25-year member of the Canadian Institute of Quality Surveyors and former VP of a large electrical company. He loved playing golf and often did so with his close friend Tom Finlay.

Glen was an accomplished classical pianist. He played in Scotland with Jimmy MacLeod

and Jimmy Shand, and in Canada with Ed Brydie, Bobby Frew, and Bobby Brown. Dancing in the Park was a favourite venue (the above picture was taken at DITP 2009). We extend sincere sympathy to his wife, Olive (née MacGregor), and his children, Roderick, Gillian, and Vivien.


