THE TORONTO ASSOCIATION NEWSLETTER ~ MAY 2014

The Toronto Association and the SCD community lost a wonderful teacher and friend on February 22, 2014. Over 400 people attended his memorial service, February 28, in celebration of his life, the extent of his love and devotion to his family, and his deep abiding faith.

Steve was a sincere and joyful man, an enthusiastic supporter of Scottish country dancing, and the people he met dancing enriched his life immeasurably. He genuinely hoped that others were equally enriched.



A man of many facets, Steve was a retired school principal, head of a mathematics department, active Anglican Cleric and Honorary Assistant for 44 years, Air Force Chaplain, avid recreational sailor, pipe-smoking motorcyclist, camper, clogger, weaver, and stone carver. Musically, he played the bodhrán, violin, autoharp, Appalachian dulcimer, and 7 flutes, including the North American flute. Constantly in pursuit of new interests, in 1994 Steve and Betty enrolled in the Gaelic College of Celtic Arts & Crafts on Cape Breton Island, where Steve signed up for weaving, Betty for Celtic harp, and both for Gaelic language studies. During enrollment they noticed there was still an empty block on their timetable and at the registrar's suggestion both signed up for Scottish country dancing. Though the introduction came about by sheer chance, Betty recalls "It was love at first step," and, despite the occasional bruises she inflicted on Steve's shins, it was the beginning of a

long and happy association with Scottish country dancing.

When they returned home, they mentioned this experience to their friend George Duncan, a Scottish country dancer, who whisked them off to Keith Bark's Erin Mills beginners' class in Mississauga. One year later they courageously joined Jean Hamilton's class. Although challenging for them at times, they enjoyed these Tuesday and Friday night dancing expeditions and subsequently progressed to Level 3 Branch Classes.

Like many new dancers, attending their first Tartan Ball was a terrifying experience. However, prudently avoiding some of the more difficult dances on the programme, they finished the evening reasonably well pleased with their prowess.

Later, Jean Hamilton invited them to join her demo team; they danced at festivals, schools, retirement homes, and Scottish community events. It made for a busy timetable and shows the depth of their involvement in Scottish country dancing.

Jean and Keith encouraged Steve to study for his SCD certification, and with their excellent support and hours of practice, he gained his full certificate in 2003. He later taught work-shops in Ottawa, Kitchener, Peterborough, Alliston, and Level 3 Branch classes. Other leader-ship roles included Chair of Toronto Association (2003-2005), Chair of West Toronto Ball, Chair of West End Workshop, and executive member of TAC (Teachers' Association, Canada).

He taught classes at the Burlington Senior Centre and shared teaching at the Burlington Branch with Margaret Morrison. He taught his last class in Burlington when he was so sick he could hardly stand, yet he was determined not to miss it. Shortly before he succumbed to his illness, he was asked by a nurse what his goal for wellness was and he replied "Teaching Scottish country dancing".

We honour a member of our society whose voice alone commanded attention and respect, and whose dance briefings were succinct, clear, memorable, and unmistakable (and sometimes applauded). The Scottish poet Thomas Campbell (1777-1844) leaves us with hope in lines from *Hallowed Ground* (1825).

But strew his ashes to the wind Whose sword or voice has served mankind, And is he dead, whose glorious mind Lifts thine on high? To live in hearts we leave behind, is not to die.

RSCDS Toronto (is) pleased to announce Dancing in the Park (DITP) will once again be held every Tuesday in June from 7 p.m. to dusk at Edwards Gardens. DITP has been held here (and at Sunnybrook Park) since 1965. According to records, it was started by Tom Cunningham of the Scarborough Social Group, together with the Metropolitan Toronto Parks

Department. In 1968 it was taken over by Toronto Branch and it has evolved over the years to become an outreach/publicity event to attract new dancers and potential new members.

Information/Donation tables are staffed by volunteers who answer enquiries and promote September Beginner Classes. Potential dancers are encouraged to participate in the simpler dances to get a taste of the fun involved. I myself discovered SCD at Edwards Gardens and began Beginner Classes in 2008.

The annual cost of DITP consists of the Park Permit and the band (approximately \$4000). We receive a subsidy of about \$900 from the Musicians' Fund. We also get half the 50/50 lottery revenues from monthly dances (\$700 is estimated for 2014). DITP attendees' donations were approximately \$1900 in 2013, which helped offset expenses. Therefore, with anticipated revenues/subsidies of approximately \$3500, we expect a shortfall of about \$500 — which might be eliminated by increased donations from new and existing members.

We are grateful to Laird Brown, who has reduced Scotch Mist from 5 members to 4 for the 2014 DITP in an effort to help out, and the Toronto Association thanks him for his support.

Our membership (currently at 375) and dancers who come out to DITP and make a generous donation will keep the event going in 2014 and the years to come. When you come to dance, please put \$10 (or what you can) in the donations box.

As Convenor, I'm looking forward to four June evenings of warm, dry weather and a great turnout each Tuesday. We have no rain location this year so if weather's bad, the evening's event will be cancelled. "Go... or No Go" will be posted on the website by 4 p.m. that day.

Edwards Gardens is booked; the band is ready to play, and the briefers have studied the dances, so invite friends or acquaintances to come and join in the fun!

"Dancing makes everything feel better" or... How two grandparents 'survived' the Youth Ball



Scottish country dancers who are convinced of the many benefits of dancing are often puzzled that their families are not so convinced or cannot find the time to "join in the fun." To get two of our grandchildren, Ayla (11) and Jasmine (9), exposed to the

delights of dancing, in January we committed to taking them to the Rosedale children's classes every Saturday morning. Their parents faced the challenge of juggling dancing classes with the girls' many other activities and of ensuring an early start on Saturdays. Once the girls experienced the wonderful teaching of Moira Korus and Teresa Lockhart, they were "hooked". After only three months they were invited to experience the Youth Ball.

Unlike many of us older dancers, their minds are like sponges; on our drive home from a ball practice, Jasmine recited *John McAlpin* without prompting and used all the correct dancing terminology ... quite remarkable, we thought. However, that feat did not prevent her from worrying that she would make mistakes and cause someone to trip at the ball. We had planned to have an evening with the girls to practise the dances and to have Ayla practise briefing *Waratah Weaver* but extracurricular activities denied us that opportunity. When we went to pick them up for the ball, all was not well; Ayla did not like her dress and Jasmine had fallen earlier in the day and injured her knee. The prevailing mood did not reflect the usual pre-ball excitement that we experience. When we arrived at



the ball, we were struck by the beautifully set tables, the decorations, and the number of adults who were volunteering their time to make the evening so special. But to the girls, they were entering a strange and unfamiliar world. We were anxious about leaving them but knew they were in capable hands and that we were only ten minutes away.

When we returned to pick them up, we did not know what to expect. Immediately we sensed the excitement and energy in the room. The ball was still in progress and the girls did not even know we were there; they were too busy enjoying themselves. The music of Don Bartlett and his band, the happiness of the teachers and volunteers, and the joy of all the youth had created a magical atmosphere.

On our way home, we asked Jasmine if her knee was still hurting. She replied, "It's fine... dancing makes everything feel better." Tellingly, the voice of a child expresses the sentiments of us all, in more ways than one.

What's in a Name? The Queen City Salute



The Serpentine Wall at Yeatman's Park in Cincinnati is an undulating flood wall where the Ohio River laps against the bottom step. Serpentine walls are sometimes called crinkle crankle walls.

Participants in the April Monthly Dance will have had the enjoyment of sampling *The Queen City Salute*, a well-crafted 64bar medley. It is a strathspey/reel combo that concludes with a lovely formation called the Serpentine.

But what is the provenance of this royal salute? In Canada, there are three queenly cities reaching from coast to coast with a third directionally in the middle...provincial capitals all. We have Victoria, BC, in the west, Charlottetown, PEI, in the east (Charlotte was the missus of King George II), and Regina, Sask. (Latin word for 'queen' as most of us know), kind of in the middle. Scottish country dancing seems to thrive in all three. Is this Salute for one of them?

Maybe not, because in Hyde Park, London, there is a reach of water called the Serpentine, and a short stroll down Constitution Hill from there brings one to Buckingham Palace, home of Her Majesty. HM Queen Elizabeth II is, of course, Patron of the Royal Scottish Country Society and in her day was an accomplished dancer. Is London the Queen City at issue?

Well, as the expression goes ... none of the above! The Queen City of this dance happens to be Cincinnati, a mid-western US city on the banks of the Ohio River where Scottish country dancing is apparently alive and well. Let's see now. Did I spell that correctly? One N, then two Ns and one T. That's it! And why is it referred to as the Queen City?

It is said to originate with Henry Wadsworth Longfellow's poem *Catawba Wine* (memorializing the city's vineyards) in which he referred to Cincinnati as "... the Queen of the West, / In her garlands dressed. / On the banks of the Beautiful River."

As it happens, I have quite a personal familiarity with Cincinnati. It is the international headquarters of a multi-national marketing corporation of consumer products called Procter & Gamble (that's "er" not "or") for which I toiled throughout my Canadian business life. Prior to retirement, I spent many happy hours there ... and some a little less so.

Way back, there was a Roman aristocrat named Cincinnatus who in his day (around the year 460 BC) was a paragon of civic virtue on whom this US city was modelled many centuries later. And the Serpentine? Guess what? Cincinnati has a tourist attraction along the Ohio River bank. It is called the Serpentine Wall.

Finally, who should be credited for this interesting medley? The dance was devised by one G. Dale Birdsall, a Montrealer originally, who I believe moved to the US and settled in Cincinnati. The *Queen City Salute* was published in Volume 2 of RSCDS Book 37 (*Frae A' The Airts*), which I guess would be some time in the early 1990s.

The Flowers of. . . The Kitchen



Not everyone would recognize this Pilling dance diagram as *The Flowers of Edinburgh*. For example, here is Patricia Young's interpretation:

She has also attended TAC Summer School. Her commitment to and love of Scottish country dancing is an example to us all.

Sue Ann has convened Branch classes (2009 to 2013), and sold clothes at workshops. She was secretary of the Glenview group and will be its membership secretary in the coming year.

Sue Ann's many contributions to RSCDS Toronto and to our Woodglen group and others merit recognition.



Bob McQuillan

Robert George McQuillan started dancing with Betty Thompson shortly after she formed the group in Newtonbrook United Church in 1969, where he and his wife (also Betty) are still members. Over 4 decades later, he's still dancing on Monday nights. He attended the first TAC Summer School in Kingston, organized by Betty

Thompson and assisted by Bob Blackie. Bob has been a stalwart member of Newtonbrook SCD for nearly 45 years.

Cummer Avenue United Church (as Newtonbrook is now known since amalgamation with Northminster United in June 2013) is always locked, so Bob always arrives early, regardless of weather conditions, to greet and admit the dancers. He also does a security check at the end of each dance evening to ensure the building is securely locked. For more than two years, a refugee sought asylum in the church, so security was crucial.

Since it began, Bob has arranged for the church hall to host the Youth Ball, as he did for the 2012 event, Favourite Tartan Ball Dances.

In bygone days, he danced in Betty Thompson's Newtonbrook demo team at various events: seniors' centres and nursing homes, St. John's Convalescent Home June Garden Party, and Gala Day demos in Toronto and Hamilton when the Toronto Branch had joint galas. He happily plays piano for us to sing birthday greetings to dancers, and he freely treats us to a tune or two on one or several of his "mouthies" at Christmas and end-of-season dance parties. In grades eight and nine, he was a member of the school's harmonica band.
