Chris Elliott

Chris has been an active dancer and member of the Toronto
Association since 2009. She currently dances at Scarborough and
Petronella and was also a member of the Fallingbrook group.

She has been the treasurer of the Scarborough Social Group since 2010 and helped with the organization of the very popular Christmas Dance that Scarborough ran for many years. As "Keeper of the Purse", she is always the first to arrive at the hall to make sure the tea supplies are ready, the chairs are out, and the sign-up sheet is in place — things that many of us take for granted.

At the branch level, Chris has been an active member of the Demo Pool since 2009 and has danced at many, many demonstration events. She has been the Convenor of the 50/50 Draw Committee since the 2010-2011 dance season. Again, this is a task that goes largely unnoticed, but she guarantees a winner every month!

She has also organized Scottish country dance classes at a local seniors' centre, inviting some current dancers to help the participants get through basic formations.

Chris is a dedicated member of the association who prefers a quiet approach to helping and deserves recognition for all her involvement with both the Association and her social groups. She is truly an emblem of volunteerism keeping SCD alive and well.

Donalda McDonald

Donalda joined RSCDS Toronto Association in 1977 and received her full certificate in St. Andrews in 1990. She was a reliable substitute teacher at Trinity, and by the year 2000 she was added as one of the teachers at Glenview, and soon after she was teaching Branch Classes.

Before long, she added Don Mills and Scarborough social groups to her busy schedule, both in 2004, and the Tayside Morning class was also added to her already busy week.

Donalda served on the Teachers' Panel and devised the programmes for Dancing in the Park both in 2004 and 2015.

She regularly attended St. Andrews Summer School and brought home teaching notes from the new books to share with her fellow Toronto teachers.

Much of what teachers do is unpaid and is taken for granted by their classes; the time it takes to choose the dances, interpret and teach the dances, and to choose music for these dances. Donalda's class preparation was exemplary, and she seldom had to look at her notes when teaching a class – she made it seem so easy. If you listened closely while she would teach, you could often hear her throw out little gems, sometimes a dancing note, and sometimes a little amusement – if you paid attention, you were often rewarded.

Donalda was a great supporter of Branch events and would brief for all her social groups when needed. If it wasn't a night for her to brief, she would be on the dance floor, helping new dancers though the dance.

Having four social groups at the same time is remarkable, and many dancers were fortunate to be part of these as well as her Association classes. Although she has relinquished her social groups, dancers continue to enjoy her company at Trinity, where she has been a member since 2007.




The phrase "grow a company" seems strange to me, but a dictionary definition includes "promote the development of". That's exactly what the marketing committee and many others have done and will be trying to do.

On the 13th of April 2019 the last assessment of the old DAA syllabus was held in Toronto. Seven dancers bravely put themselves forward to be assessed on their dancing skills. Three youngsters were to be assessed at Medal Test Grade 2.

Several months before, I had agreed to be the lead assessor and help to train the other assessor by video link. This was very exciting for me. Barbara Taylor took a bit of convincing that she might be capable of doing the assessment with me. She thought about it and agreed to be trained.

This was innovative – no one had gone through the procedure before. She was given some DAA videos to watch and assess at her home. We then met on Skype and discussed both of our assessments. We spent quite a while on two occasions going over different

assessments using the old assessment sheets; then we compared some of the results by completing the new assessment sheet. It was a complete joy. Amazingly, we came to the same grades on most occasions. In my opinion, this method of training could be used throughout the world.

The day of the assessment in April came round very quickly. Seven dancers of varying ages came to be assessed at the DAA Advanced level from the Rosedale class. They had chosen to participate in the assessment as their challenge for this year. Sure, they were nervous, but they gave their all. It was fab!

It always amazes me to see people Dance Scottish throughout the world and get so much enjoyment from it. The enthusiasm, concentration, and effort were clear to both of us assessors

We saw some lovely dancing that morning and the teachers should be proud of their students. They did Toronto proud. Barbara showed how good her observation skills were, and the whole assessment went well. I was very pleased on how everything worked out.

Thank you to everyone in Toronto who provided such kindness to me during my 5-day visit. It was all too short. The whole trip was an absolute joy, and I hope it will not be too long until I am back in a city I have come to treat as my second home.

TEMPUS FUGIT! TIME FLIES! (A Quarter Century of Scottish Country Dancing at Queen Victoria Public School)



Once again, this year Scottish country and Ceilidh dancing happened at Queen Victoria Public School (QVPS) in Parkdale. During the lunch hour children from Grades 2 and 3 gather in the school foyer for a taste of a cultural tradition that is purely Scottish. The school becomes alive with the sound of Scottish music and excited participants who have

looked forward to this moment with anticipation. They dance for forty-five minutes, three days a week. They wait impatiently for the dancing to begin, and when it does, they dance with joy. Watching them dance makes me think of this Hopi proverb, "To see us dance is to hear our hearts speak." When their session is over, five kindergarten classes take over the foyer separately for a half-hour each, and they also dance Scottish. Together, over one hundred children proudly participate in this Scottish dance experience each

week for two months. This year is extra special as it's the 25th year of QVPS's involvement in this dance activity. A quarter of a century!

We celebrated this Silver Anniversary at a gala April 12. Four favourite children's dances were featured: *Prince of Orange, Kingston* Flyer, Virginia Reel, and I Want To Be Near You, a four-couple dance in a square set. Piper Jost Kaempffer, of the Toronto Firefighters Pipe Band, marched dancers to the hall with tunes that make the heart leap and then played a gentle strathspey to quell the excitement before the dancing. After the assembly, he dismissed the audience and the dancers back to their classes with more marching tunes. Everyone in Kindergarten to Grade 3, teachers, and some parents made an audience of almost 300 who watched and applauded each dance. The dancers delivered a stellar performance!

Scottish dancing at QVPS was introduced in 1994 upon my return from an exchange year teaching in Edinburgh. The idea of introducing Scottish tradition through dance was well received by the school, whose student population comes from many parts of the globe: Vietnam, India, China, Hungary, Tibet, the Caribbean Islands, Korea, the Philippines, Sri Lanka, Somalia, and Canada. Initially, the motivation was to provide children with an activity that would shelter and keep them warm during the cold winter days. I felt it was most unfair to send them out in the freezing cold to endure their first taste

of our harsh Canadian winter at lunch time. Many of them when they were told to stay outside while teachers were at lunch would go out one door and surreptitiously come in another and then huddle around a radiator by the doors for warmth and comfort. So Scottish dancing was initiated. The children loved it and happily participated.

I reflect on what has been achieved in the past 25 years. The children became aware of Scotland and have wondered what Scotland is really like. They discovered that Scots came to Canada for a better life in a foreign country — just as they and their parents did. The dancers learned basic formations that enable them to do simple dances and they developed positive social interaction, and an appreciation of Scottish music, songs, poetry, tartan, and bagpipes. They performed at

many annual QVPS Christmas and Spring concerts, participated several times in RSCDS Toronto gala days, and entertained visiting educators, including those from New Orleans and Auckland, New Zealand. They have celebrated Robert Burns' birthday by reading and memorizing poems of the bard, thus making them members of The

> Burns Federation, and they received certificates signed by Scotland's Minister of Culture.

In 2015 the school was awarded a Silver Accreditation in the Primary School Accreditation Program from the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society headquarters in Edinburgh for consistent involvement and commitment to Scottish dancing. According to James Stott, Director of Summer School at St Andrews, QVPS is the only school outside the UK to receive this award.

Teaching Scottish country dancing has been most satisfying for me. I have found it rewarding to see children from many ethnic backgrounds gain insight into Scottish culture through Scottish dancing and other related activities. I am thrilled and inspired that many children at Queen Victoria Public School, past and present, have discovered that, indeed, "Happiness is Scottish country dancing."
